State Policies Impacting CTE

2014 Year in Review

Although this is only the second annual State Policias Impoching CTE: 2014 Year in Review, a clear pattern is emerging. For the second year in a row, a significant number of states have developed and implemented mew policies and programs to advance career and technical education (CTE) at the secondary and postsecondary levels.

Just as we found in the 2013 Year in Review, nearly every state had CTE-related activity this past year, with state legislatures and regulatory bodies approving roughly 130 policies across 46 states and the District of Columbia in 2014.

This continued spike in CTE-related policies indicates a growing awareness and interest in using CTE as a mean to increase postsecondary credential attainment, provide students with real-world experience and prepare a workforce with the knowledge and skills necessary to maintain the nation's competitive edge.

Key Takeaways

For the second year in a row, funding has snagged the top popt, with 36 states providing soddinant funding for CTE in some form. Notable were Collymnia, which formalized a S20 million investment in its Career Pathways Truct Grent, and South Dokoter with its new 50 million Substance programs. Some other funding bumps came in the form of taxincentivized donations (Alabama) and grants (Jawa) in an effort to increase business-education collaboration, in fact, public-private partnerships were more prominent in 2014 policies than in the prior year. Twenty-eight states passed legislation and approved policies designed to a scelerate employer engagement with CTE to help align programs with labor market demands and offer work-based learning apportunities.

Consistent with last year, legislation and policy directed at earning pastescendary credit in high school and articulating credit across institutions was the third most common activity. This is not surprising given that education and training seyonal high school is the new norm. In 2014, this topic garnered attention from state legislative and regulatory bodies in 24 states. For example, the Nevado State Board of Education and Soard of Regulators paperoved a new policy to develop statewide articulation agreements for all CTE programs of their

Continuing the trend of policies focused on business engagement and workforce preparation, industry-recognized credentials received a slightificant amount of attention. In 2014, 18 states approved measures or funds to accelerate credentials attainment (Konsas and Fannessea), inform parents about the return on investment (ROI) for certain credentials (Konsas and Fannessea), inform parents about object of the return or investment (ROI) for certain credentials (Roinsia), and establish grant programs that would provide training for critical industries like manuracturing (Illinois and Delioware). In Konsas, for example, the states 2012 Boot in CTI (egilistion, which simed to accelerate secondary students' credential statisment, stimulated so much interest that Isawmakers had to appropriate an additional 59.2 pmillion to cover costs.

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Funding

- California: \$250 million Career Pathways Trust grant
- South Dakota: \$50 million scholarship program for students entering high-need workforce programs
- Alabama: Scholarships for CTE dual enrollment with tax incentives for supporting businesses
- Iowa: \$5 million for the Kibbie Skilled Workforce
 Shortage Tuition Grant Program





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Industry Partnerships/Work-based Learning

- lowa: funds for statewide network of intermediaries to increase work-based learning
- Trend across states: Grant funding tied to business-education collaboration

Industry-recognized Credentials

- Kansas: funds to incentivize industry certifications
- Florida: certification ROI provided to parents





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Requirements/CTE Pathways to Graduation

- Missouri, Michigan and Washington: CTE courses can substitute for academic courses toward graduation
- Louisiana: development of a career diploma that is equal to a standard diploma
- New York: state-approved CTE pathway
- Ohio: graduation options include attaining industryrecognized credentials





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Dual/Concurrent Enrollment; Articulation

- Alabama: scholarships and tax credit for CTE dual enrollment
- Nevada: statewide articulation agreements for all CTE programs of study

Data/Reporting/Accountability

- Maine: new state commission created to maintain, disseminate education, workforce data
- Other trends: CTE added to school report card accountability; grant funding tied to performance outcomes
